NATIONAL FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT PROGRAM SERVICES [Commonly provided to caregivers]

Q. 3) **Respite Care:** Services which offer the caregiver a brief period of time off from taking care of [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME]. These services can include:

- **In-Home Respite Care:** Someone comes in to give the caregiver time off from taking care of [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME].
- **Adult Day Care Respite Care** [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] goes to an adult day care facility for several hours or more, on a temporary basis, to give the caregiver time off from taking care of [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME].
- **Overnight Facility Respite Care:** [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] goes to an overnight care facility, on a temporary basis, to give the caregiver time off from taking care of [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME].

Q. 4) **Help or information to connect you to services and resources:** [Sometimes called "Access Assistance"] Someone in the aging network helping the caregiver fill out forms or helping to get qualified for certain services; also involves aging network personnel providing information about services available within the community, linking individuals to those services, and following up to make sure that the caregiver is connected to the services needed.

Q. 5) **Caregiver education or training** includes the following:

- **Caregiver Training or Caregiver Education:** Classes or personal instruction that help the caregiver make decisions or solve problems related to providing care or the caregiver's caregiving role.
- **Individual Caregiver Counseling:** Personal assistance to caregivers who are concerned about their roles and responsibilities.
- **Caregiver Support Group:** Meetings or sessions that allow caregivers to talk to other caregivers to discuss mutual issues and concerns.

Q. 6) **Supplemental services:** These services are generally provided on a limited or emergency basis to supplement the care provided by caregivers. Examples of supplemental services may include, but are not limited to, home modifications, assistive

technologies, or incontinence supplies. **Interviewers should use lists of services that are available in their local area.**

TITLE III SERVICES

[Commonly provided to care recipients]

- A) **Adult Day Care:** [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] goes to a day care facility for several hours or more on a regular basis.
- B) **Case Management:** Someone assesses [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME]'s needs, authorizes & arranges services, and provides follow-up contact.
- C) **Homemaker:** Someone comes to help with things like cooking, laundry, cleaning, or shopping for [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME].
- D) **Home Health Aide:** Someone comes to give [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] help with personal care activities such as bathing, dressing, eating or nursing assistance.
- E) **Home Delivered Meals:** Someone delivers healthy meals to [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] or to the caregiver at the caregiver's home.
- F) **Chore Service:** Someone comes to caregiver's house or [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME]'s house to do chores such as heavy cleaning or some types of yard work.
- G) **Transportation:** Trips for [CARE RECIPIENT'S NAME] or for caregiver to travel to needed activities.
- H) **Information about Services:** Information about various types of help and services that are available in the caregiver's community.
